MUSEUM NEWS

TRAFALGAR HOLDEN MUSEUM

Hartnett Estate 'Woody' Wagon Motor Car no. 1068, c 1952-53, January 2023.

A 1952 Hartnett station wagon, which is one of the first Australian made cars, has been acquired by the Trafalgar Holden Museum, with funding assistance from the National Cultural Heritage Account.



This vintage car, which was designed and built in Australia in the early 1950's, is a survivor of attempts to mass produce an "Australian" car, by an Australian owned company, financed by Australian capital.

It is an important symbol of Australian post-war optimism and the challenges faced when Australia pursued industrial self-sufficiency.

This beautifully restored vehicle was built by the Hartnett Motor Company Ltd, an Australian company

established by Sir Laurence Hartnett. He was known as 'the Father of Holden' and an elder statesman of the Australian automotive industry.

With only two similar Hartnetts in Australian public collections (the two door 'Tasman' sedan in Museums Victoria, and the two door 'Pacific' tourer in the National Motor Museum), the purchase of this Woody Wagon sedan is not only important to Trafalgar Holden Museum's collection, it help preserve Australia's cultural heritage.

It will both expand the range of Hartnett models on display and open the door to future research.

This car has been acquired by the Trafalgar Holden Museum with \$115,000 assistance from the National Cultural Heritage Account. It will be on public display from early to mid 2023.



FEATURE ARTICLE

The Australian Monthly – MOTOR MANUAL April, 1949

Notably and linked to the Trafalgar Holden Museum News, the following article was printed: -

"HARTNETT'S CAR FACTORY SITE"

Plans for making a new Australian car manufacturing centre were discussed at a recent meeting of Ferntree Gully Shire Councilors when Messrs. L.J. Hartnett and Errol Coote explained their company's plan to acquire 150 to 200 acres for the factory, and build a garden city of pre-fabricated houses for employees.

It was proposed to start with a staff of 500, ultimately reaching 1,250.

Messrs. Hartnett and Coote expressed satisfaction with possibilities of railway sidings and loop lines at Bayswater, and suitability of the soil for carrying heavy plant.

The township is about 18 miles from Melbourne, near Ringwood and offered good prospects of becoming the manufacturing centre for Australia's new "Peoples Car" to sell for about \$350.

Both Messrs. Harnett and Coote were formerly Executives of General Motors associated with the development of the Holden.

Mr. Hartnett said that the State Government had offered a site at Ballarat, but it was feared that freights would prove prohibitive. The Federal Government had suggested the Acquisition of an existing factory in Queensland.

Another relevant article about fossil fuel and the exploration of oil in Australia, New Zealand and New Guinea: -

"There IS Oil but not all is suitable for refining"

There has always been great speculation on the part of the public as to whether there really is oil in Australia, and actually there is definitely oil in Australia, but a lot of it is not in sufficient quantity nor nor is t suitable for the production of petrol.

It is many years since oil was first discovered at Lakes Entrance in Victoria and shale oil is available at Glen Davis in New South Wales. Oil has been found at Roma in Queensland and much development work is going on there.

Since the war a number of major oil companies have taken very definite steps to try and discover oil in Australia in payable quantities. The Shell Company is at present carrying out oil exploration work over a large area of Queensland.

One of the pioneer companies in the race for oil is the Australasian Petroleum Company Pty. Ltd., which was formed in 1938 to search for oil in New Guinea.

Other firms interested in this enterprise are the Vacuum Oil Company, the d'Arcy Exporation Company, Nominated Holdings Pty. Ltd., and Oil Search Ltd.

There is oil in New Guinea but it will take a long time to get it out. The programme commenced by Australasian Petroleum has been renewed with great activity. The work is slow and tedious and includes aerial surveys, geographical and topographical surveys covering an enormous area of what is often almost inaccessible. The company has met with some success and our map shows the area KARIAVA where the Company is concentrating its efforts and has found oil.

In Australia progress is reported from Roma and seismic equipment, now being prepared, and the first of its kind to be used in Australia, will be sent to Roma shortly. The RAAF has assisted by a complete aerial survey of 10,000 square miles held under lease by Roma Blocks Oil Company.

At Lakes Entrance the Australian Oil Drilling Syndicate has proposed to explore geophysically the area extending from Lakes Entrance to Mario. Lakes Oil Limited had reported that results from exploratory drilling at Lakes Entrance warranted the Company proceeding with further developments.

NEW ZEALAND OIL

The first oil strike in New Zealand for 15 years has been made by the New Zealand. Oil Refineries Limited., at Maturoa, Taranaki. Seven barrels a day have been drawn from 2,222 feet depth.

So in 1949, Exploration had only really begun in Ernst only to be under pressure to become replaced by electric vehicle in less than 70 years.


The National Motor Museum is now CASHLESS

The National Motor Museum, formerly also known as The Old Mill and Birdwood Mill after its initial location, is an automobile museum in the Adelaide Hills in the township of Birdwood, South Australia.

Today, it is an integral part of the Bay to Birdwood Rally, held annually and attracting well over one thousand vehicles from all over Australia.



It holds a large exhibition as part of GMH vehicle dispersement across Australia after the closure of manufacturing in Australia.



Early History of the National Motor Museum

(Extract from the catalogue – The Birdwood Mill Motor Museum – date unknown)

INTRODUCTION

From the time of its foundation in 1965 by a well-known motor cycling personality Mr. Jack Kaines, the Birdwood Mill Museum has had on display the largest and most varied collection of motor cycles in Australia, together with a number of interesting cars and a splendid collection of motoring equipment and components.

It had been my desire for many years to help establish a first-class motor museum in South Australia, and when the opportunity arose to combine my personal collection of Historic cars and motor cycles

with that of the Birdwood collection, it therefore seemed an ideal foundation on which to establish a World class Motor Museum at Birdwood.

What you see today is the first major stage in the development of this Motor Museum, part of an overall plan by which the Birdwood Mill Museum is being developed into South Australia's Museum of Technology and Applied Science.

It is particularly fitting that a first-class Motor Museum should be established near Adelaide, since much of the outstanding pioneering and development work in Mechanical Engineering in Australia took place in and around Adelaide. We therefore feel that this Museum is a fitting tribute to the pioneering work of South Australia's early Mechanical and Motor Engineers.

I was fortunate to grow up during a period of great interest in motor racing and entered my first open speed event at the age of 18. Since then it has been my good fortune to have the opportunity to take part in many types of motoring competition in all parts of Australia and overseas, so that it is not surprising that there should be a leaning towards competition cars, and the history of motoring competition, in the displays you see in the Birdwood Motor Museum.

In designing our Motor Museum display buildings, every effort has been made to create the atmosphere of a private motor house, and to retain as much natural lighting as possible. In this way we hope to give the best possible view of the exhibits, while maintaining the necessary level of security.

Since we firmly believe that a Motor Museum must be a live and active entity, we have built a short demonstration circuit so that exhibits from the Museum may be taken out and "exercised" by competent members of the Museum Staff on suitable occasions. With a few obvious exceptions, all exhibits are maintained in first-class working condition.

We have also established a Restoration Workshop, with a Public Viewing Gallery, so that those interested in this side of the Museum's activities can see motor cars, motor cycles, and other the many

generous gifts the museum receives are stored or put back into working order, while at the same time loan exhibits and new exhibits purchased from time to time by the Museum are repaired and restored.

In addition to creating an interesting and varied motoring display, we are particularly keen to record and illustrate the great deal of outstanding development work which has gone on from the earliest days in Australia in general, and South Australia in particular. The Museum has already built up an important collection of Australian motoring exhibits and historical items, but we would particularly appreciate further assistance in this field with the gift or loan of early Australian motoring records, examples of Australian design and manufacture, or information where such information and examples may be obtained.

Finally, we have made every effort to give our visitors maximum access to the many valuable machines and items of equipment which we have on display. In return, we particularly ask you to appreciate and respect that rarity of many of the items displayed, and thus to help us in our efforts to maintain and preserve these exhibits by not touching or handling them.

With your help and support, we believe we can create and maintain a Motor Museum of which South Australia can be proud.

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The NATIONAL MOTOR MUSEUM TODAY

The exhibits have expanded from the initial 137 on permanent display to include the following categories.....



ANTIQUE VEHICLES

The Museum defines antique vehicles as those built before 1904. The vehicles in this collection are typically imported from Europe as complete cars.



VETERAN VEHICLES

These vehicles are defined as those built between 1905 and 1918. This collection includes vehicles that demonstrate the rise in the Australian motor body building industry.



VINTAGE VEHICLES

The Museum defines these vehicles as those built between 1919 and 1930. The collection features some early Australian assembled marques.



POST-VINTAGE VEHICLES

Post-vintage is defined as vehicles built between 1931 and 1946.



CLASSIC VEHICLES

These vehicles are defined by the Museum as those built between 1946 and 1969. This collection documents the age of the family car and a period known for its unique styling.



MODERN VEHICLES

Modern vehicles are those manufactured from 1970 to the present. The collection reflects a period that represents the emergence of the Japanese automotive industry as a major competitor in the western market.



COMMERCIAL VEHICLES

This collection comprises of vehicles dating back to 1909 that are specifically designed or adapted for use in a commercial capacity.



MOTORCYCLES

Comprising of around 100 motorcycles this collection covers most aspects of motorcycling in Australia.



IMAGE COLLECTION

The image collection includes approximately 30,000 images covering a variety of motoring themes, including historic images, images of collection vehicles and some related advertising.



TOYS AND MODELS

This collection has significant appeal to both children and serious collectors. Included are die-cast models, tin toys, the more recent plastic models and pedal cars.



TECHNICAL COLLECTION

Includes examples of vehicle components that demonstrate the development of vehicles over time.



AUTOMOBILIA

The term 'automobilia' can be used to describe any historical artefact, memorabilia or collectible linked with motor vehicles and related themes.
